Troop 19 has a list of approved counselors for most merit badges the BSA offers.

Unfortunately, too many of our Scouts are relying on the merit badge workshops and summer camp to earn badges. The Scouts are losing out on an important part of the merit badge program.

Parents, you need to encourage

your sons to use the merit badge counselors to earn badges. Troop 19 requires that Scouts use the Buddy System when working with counselors.

Have your son choose a badge that interests him, get a buddy to work with him then contact **Brad Clark** for the name of a counselor approved by the Council to teach the skills.

19 tee shirt and his Troop 19 hat at all meetings. If the Troop is in Class A uniform, your son is required to have his Scout shirt and nametag and the shirt tucked in to his pants. A Scout belt is required for all uniforms. The belt can be the standard BSA web belt or a BSA or OA leather belt with BSA or OA buckle.

### Troop Uniforms



Troop 19 takes great pride in proper wearing of the Scout uniforms. Adult leaders are required to

wear the full uniform as an example for the Scouts. Parents, it is important that you and your son take time

to look over his uniform and update it. Your son should make sure that he has his current rank badge displayed, the current Quality Troop patch and his correct office or position patch.

Scouts are expected to wear Scout Take pride in your uniform and pants, Scout socks, the red Troop wear it properly.

#### Scout Assistance

When the troop loads for a trip, you son is expected to assist the troop in loading gear. He is also expected to assist the troop when we return.

This means unloading gear, storing it in the Quartermaster's hut and cleaning the Troop bus. It is important that you do not pick up your son until after these chores are completed.

Too often, these tasks fall upon a small core of Scouts who are required to spend an extra 30 – 60 minutes after the troop returns to clean up for their fellow Scouts.

Let's share this task and get all the boys to participate in the duties. If

everyone helps, the work can be done very quickly and everyone can get home.




