Double H High Adventure Base

Started in the summer of 2004, the Double H High Adventure Base is Philmont Scout Ranch's newest program. Located on the Torstenson Family Wildlife Center in Datil, New Mexico, the Double H is over 100,000 acres of rugged wilderness.

Seven-day backpacking programs give crews the freedom to hike without trails. A Wilderness Guide (Double H staff member) accompanies the crew for the entire trek. Programs provided at the Martin (backcountry) Camp and the Wilderness Guide include geocaching, GPS navigation skills, challenge/team building events, black powder shooting, archery, astronomy, conservation projects, search & rescue, and more.

Troop 19's Nicholas King attended the Double H adventure this summer and wrote this report.

This summer I had the privilege of going to one of BSA's newest high adventure programs, the Double H Scout Ranch. Double H is run by the same scout council that runs the Philmont Scout Ranch and is located in



New Mexico south of Albuquerque.

Double H was an incredible experience that allows scouts to see the beauty and desolation that is the New Mexico desert and mountains. The views out west are truly amazing, allowing one to see for miles, miles, and miles in any direction. One of the most exciting aspects of

trekking across the wilderness was the ability to choose our own route from campsite to campsite. The program at Double H gives scouts an itinerary of campsites, and then allows them to choose which way to get there. If you see an outcrop of rocks that looks cool, why not hike up to it and get a picture? If you want to hike the whole way along a ridge, then go for it.

While Double H does not offer programs at every campsite similar to Philmont, everything is open to how the scout wants to do things. It was really an amazing experience to me and I encourage everyone to go and see the beauty that is the New Mexico wilderness.



Top Gun 2006

Troop 19's Brendon Almond attended the National Youth Leadership Training at Camp Grimes this summer. While attending "Top Gun" Brendon wrote a journal on his experiences....

Top Gun '06

The week of Top Gun started earlier than others. I came home from summer camp and left for Top Gun, spending less than 24 hours at home. I had to start packing for this trip two weeks in advance.

Saturday

We left Camp Grimes early so we

could get back to Huntersville and to be home. Once the Troop 19 bus got back to the church. I tried to help them unpack the bus but Mr. Banks told me to go home and pack. Well that's what I did.

I packed all day. I didn't watch any television, just packed. Once I packed my backpack, I went to sleep. I went to sleep early because I had to be back up at Camp Grimes by eleven o'clock Sunday morning.

Sunday (day one)

I woke up and got ready to go by taking a shower. (Little did I know that that shower would be my last shower for five days). I put my pack in the car and headed for Camp Grimes. It was a two hour drive, so we had to leave at about nine o'clock a.m.



When we arrived, I registered and got started. Once registered, I found out that I was in the Yellow patrol.

The first night, we camped close to the Hornets Nest shelter. After the

campsite was setup, we had our first troop assembly and none of us were happy. No one really wanted to be there so our spirits were low. But my spirit was strong and the first day I jumped on the opportunity to be patrol leader.

The week of Top Gun got started off to a rough start. We started fixing dinner at about five and then before long it started to rain, hard and fast. The rain very quickly worsened. The worst thing was the thunder and lighting. The Yellow Patrol had set up our dining fly in the worst position, a low point. Before long our "kitchen" was under water. Luckily, we had finished fixing and eating dinner. All we did in the heat of the moment was pick up the stove and move to another patrol's dining fly.

I had to save the stove and others got there rain gear. Well, I did not get mine when I should have. So I ran with the stove to the Green Patrol's dining fly. Our dining fly had become part of a massive puddle. We declared it "Top Gun Lake".

One of my good friends AI McCreary (his call name is Tabasco) was in that patrol. It had not been long before the rain started to flood the area. Earlier, when we set up our tents, AI set his up in the wrong spot. His tent was getting flooded. He tried to block the water from getting in his tent with some logs. Keep in mind that it is raining with lighting, and its thundering and its coming closer. My friend Tabasco, did not have any rain gear either. He was trying to block his tent from water and the water was deep, coming over his boots and he was soaking wet. All I could do was watch these events unfold in front of me.

The storm came closer and lighting struck close, no more than twenty feet from me. That was closer than lighting has ever been to me throughout my life. The hair on my neck and legs stood up (my hair on my head was too wet to stand up). Tabasco was standing in the water, and when the lighting struck his knees buckled and eyes shut though he didn't fall down.

We all were going to go to the bathrooms and ride the storm out after that, but Sparky (a youth leader on staff) came running and told us to go to the Hornets Nest Shelter. Once back there, we waited for the storm to die down. It took a while but we were back on track when it was time for the opening campfire. The campfire was a blast. It really got our spirits up before we went to bed.

Monday (day two)

The morning started very slowly for me. I didn't get any sleep that night. The patrol had to be up, finished eating and cleaned up before eight o'clock a.m.. Our troop guide was Galahad (another youth leader on staff). He came to inspect our campsite before Troop Assembly. Once he inspected, we headed down for Troop Assembly. There we had our first morning Troop Assembly, (before long we got into the hang of things).

At the assembly we had to present our flags and flaunt them. Ours (the yellow patrol) did not have a pole. Be-

fore the flags, each patrol leader had to give an inspection report, aloud, to show that everyone one was in full uniform. Then there was the presentation of awards. Awards were the Spirit Stick, for spirit, the Monkey Fist, which was for program patrol, the Golden Shovel, which is for the service patrol. Finally it came down to



Chuck the Duck (which is a plastic duck), given to the patrol that shows the most chivalry and cheerfulness and follows the Scout Oath and Law. Once everything was done, we left the assembly and went to the OTC (Outdoor Training Center). This is where we had all of the presentations.

After our first presentation for the day, (Setting Your Goals) we had a patrol meeting. Once that was completed, we had another presentation (Preparing your Goals). Afterwards, we had a model Patrol Leaders Council Meeting. Then we had a Patrol Lunch Planning Challenge, (this is very important because it taught us how to plan what we needed). After lunch, we headed back to the OTC for a model Troop Meeting {TM}. After that we had a pioneering project, and my patrol built a tent thing because we foresaw rain in the future.

At Top Gun, you move your campsite every day. We hiked up the hill a little ways to a new campsite. Once that was over, we had to prepare for dinner. Later, we had to go back to the OTC for a model worship service. Then came the event we had been waiting for all day - the movie. I do believe that if had not been for that movie, we all would have been in horrible moods for the next day.

Tuesday (day three)

Tuesday morning was the same as Monday. Although this morning, when Galahad came to inspect, we had a great campsite and we did very well on inspection. We headed down for Troop Assembly. It was a normal Troop Assembly. the assistant patrol leader becomes the patrol leader and we elected a new assistant patrol leader. This morning we were given our first Baden Powell Streamer. We were also awarded the Monkeys Fist. This time it was massive. Someone had wrapped it around a bowling ball! We left the assembly and went to the OTC for more presentations. At eleven thirty, we had a PLC and the patrol leader had to get the food and bring it up to our campsite. This was the day that we had tuna fish for lunch. I had never tried tuna until that day.

After we had lunch we had to break down our campsite and take all of our gear down to the OTC. Once all of our gear was down there, we had another TM. After the TM, we had some more presentations. After the pres-

entations, we had to pick up our food because we were hiking to a new campsite. The new campsite was only seven tenths of a mile away but my back pack was so heavy. I packed so much extra stuff (thought that I might be able to use it) that the hike seemed like five miles.

It was not too bad where we ended the hike. While we were hiking however, the OTC location was changed. In the new OTC, we had a Lego challenge which is helped us become better friends. Sadly, we then realized that during the hike earlier that day, we forgot to bring our flag, So, we had to go get our flag, as a patrol, which pushed us getting into bed even later.

Wednesday (day four)

The day started off just like the others. We got up and fixed breakfast but we were running late. When it came time for troop assembly, we were about ten minutes late. Once the troop assembly was over, we had another presentation. The presentation went right into a patrol activity. The patrol activity designed to teach us how to use the GPS device. Our patrol still had to break down camp for the day so we ate lunch fast.

After lunch, we had a game that was called Geocache Wide Game. In this game, we went around and applied the skills that we had been learning the whole week. Some were hard and others were just about building teamwork and trust between the patrol members. But overall, the game was there to teach us how to use the GPS device.

When we finished the game, we packed up our food and got ready to move camp again. This hike was seven tenths of a mile again, give or take a few feet. The hike felt harder because it was all up hill. On this hike our troop guide (Galahad) could help use to make sure we got where we needed to go. But we were the ones using the GPS device.

When we got to the campsite, we had to hurry and set up our campsite. The reason? We had another presentation at the OTC. The presentation was on Making Ethical Decisions. We had a camp fire in our patrol after it to talk about our own ethics and what kind of decisions to make. After the patrol campfires, we went to bed.

Thursday (day five)

Thursday came. We all got up as fast as we could and fixed and ate breakfast. When we finished eating our breakfast, we broke down camp so that we would not have to come back at lunch to finish it up. We had all of our gear and everything down to the OTC before the troop assembly.

This morning everyone was ready and wide awake for the Outpost Camp. Just like every morning before, we were told what was going to happen for the day. The new patrol leaders were sworn in and the new assistant patrol leader was sworn in. We (all of Top Gun) said hello to summer camp. But they never answered. Once all of the awards were given out, we had

one presentation. Then we had our daily PLC. At PLC, we were given all of the info for the day - two patrols were allowed to go to each event, our patrol (yellow) and the red patrol chose to go fly fishing.

So we went and ate lunch. During lunch, we packed up our backpacks and got the ready for the staff to move them. While we were out for the day, the Top Gun staff moved our packs to the Nickel Shelter. This is where we would start our hike from when we got back from our event. Once our packs were ready and everything we had a troop assembly and got ready to leave.

Mr. Nester and Mr. Parks were in charge of the fly fishing event. I had never gone fly fishing in my life before this event. We spent a long time in the water though only one guy caught a fish. Even though I did not catch anything, I am so glad that I chose to go fly fishing.

We were running out of time, so we all packed it up and got ready to go back to Camp Grimes. The Fly Fishers got back first. I do not know what gut us started, but as a patrol, we started singing. We were in the best mood that we had been in all week.

It took a while to wait for all of the other patrols to arrive. Once they came, we loaded up and got ready for the hike. This time our troop guide could not help use with the GPS device. It took a long time to get to the campsite. I think we got to the campsite right at about eight thirty p.m. This was a true test of our skills; the hike was over one and a half miles long. We were all tired though we were happy because our dinner was easy to fix and clean up. Thank gosh it was because we were tired. So we cleaned up and went to sleep. **Friday (day six)**

This morning we got up very early. We decided to get up early so that we could pack up and get out of the campsite area. We had to hike out of the woods. And be back at eight fifteen a.m.. The troop assembly was at eight thirty a.m.. At the troop assembly, I was sworn in as the patrol leader. We all were dead after the return hike back to the OTC. This day was going to be great. We had the opportunity to take a shower and get ready for the final day. Everything just flew by before knew it, it was time to start cooking for the feast. The feast was created when everyone fixed a little something and sharing it with everyone. I don't even know what happened to that day, I could barely even blink before we were at the closing campfire.

The week of Top Gun got me thinking really hard about my life. All I know now is that I am a better leader from this week of Top Gun and that I can

handle almost anything and everything that is thrown at me.

Beaver Tales

This summer, Scout Larry Zaino attended two of the high adventure opportunities for Senior Scouts. Larry went to the Northern Tier High Adventure Base in Ely, Minnesota and later served on the OA Trail Crew at Philmont. Below is his summary of his adventures.

I had the privilege this summer to attend two national programs run by the Order of the Arrow: Philmont Trail Crew and Northern Tier Wilderness Voyage. They are both two weeks long and challenge you mentally, physically, and spiritually. Participants come from across the nation.

The first week of both programs consist of cheerful service. At Northern Tier, we worked on portage trails that were originally constructed and used by Native Americans. Portaging is the act of carrying all of your gear across trails from lake to lake. On portages you carry all of you gear; this includes an 80 pound canoe and gear packs that range from 80 to 110 pounds. My crew's service project



was to fix sixty feet trail that was eroding badly.

After our week of service we embarked on our voyage. We covered roughly 100 miles in 6 days through the isolated boundary waters of Minnesota. There were so many amazing moments on my voyage. They ranged from a midnight paddle beneath the stars, moose and bear sightings, and spectacular sunsets. Nothing can beat the feeling of accomplishment after a long day paddling and portage.



At Philmont New Mexico, my crew camped at 10,600 feet beneath Baldy Mountain and worked on a trail at 11,100 feet on the Baldy Ridge. We built 515 feet of trail, the most of any crew this summer. We climbed up Baldy and flew a kite from the top one day after lunch. The view was truly inspiring.

On our trek week we decided to go to the Valle Vidal. It is an area northeast of Philmont that only a couple handfuls of crews get to experience each summer. The



Valle Vidal has no trails. It is all map and compass work with a lot of bushwhacking.

Our first day was our longest, we covered over twenty miles. Over the course of our five day trek we covered close to seventy miles and climbed Little Costilla. Little Costilla is a couple hundred feet bigger than Baldy and boasts seven false peaks. My crew watched the sunrise from the peak. The sunrise and view were the most remarkable thing I have ever seen. On the peak the temperature dropped close to freezing.

I will never forget these adventures and the friends I made. The Order of the Arrow Trail Crew and Order of the Arrow Wilderness Voyage have been the best trips I have ever been on in Boy Scouting. I encourage those who want to seek true adventure and to push themselves to new limits to apply. You must be a member of the OA and 16 years of age on the start of the program to apply. If you have any questions feel free to ask me.




Every two years, the Order of the Arrow sponsors a gathering of all the lodges in the US for a week of training, competitions, trading, fun and fellowship. The gathering is called the National Order of the Arrow Conference. Catawba Lodge is an active participant at NOAC each year and Troop 19 frequently sends several of our Scouts to the conference. This year, Jonathan Cannito went to NOAC with the Catawba Lodge contingent when NOAC was convened at Michigan State University's campus. He writes of his experiences at his first NOAC.

NOAC 2006 Jonathan Cannito

With this being my first National Order of the Arrow Conference, I had no idea what to expect. All of the stories that I was told about past events did not even cover what NOAC truly was.
