Wood Badge

The initial invitations have been mailed and registration will soon be open to all registered Scouters to attend Wood Badge SR-933. This is the premier training course for Scouters. Designed by Lord Baden-Powell, it teaches Scouters, in as practical way as possible, the skills and methods of Scouting. Over two three-day weekends, Scouters, in their patrols, participate in intensive training. Once this portion is complete, the practical portion begins: completing the Wood Badge ticket. Over a period of six to eighteen months, Scouters complete various projects in the service to others, service to the troop, and personal growth. Upon completion of the ticket, the Scouter receives a certificate, neckerchief, a leather slide, and two small wooden beads on a leather thong.

Leaders desiring a deeper dedicated involvement in the Scouting program, and who are otherwise qualified, will find advanced training highly rewarding. Wood Badge is an advanced adult leadership training program for all leaders in Cub Scout, Boy Scout, and Venturing programs.

Wood Badge has two parts. The first is the two 3-day weekends of practical experience where you learn skills and concepts that underscore the five Themes of 21st Century Wood Badge:

- 1. Bringing the Vision to Life
- 2. Models for Success
- 3. Tools of the Trade
- 4. Leading to Make a Difference Living the Values



The 21st Century Wood Badge course brings together leaders from all areas of Scouting - Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Varsity Scouts, Venturing, and all levels of BSA's professional staff. Reflecting the best of nearly a century of Scouting experience, 21st Century Wood Badge also draws upon the most current leadership models being used by corporate America, academic circles, and successful outdoor leadership organizations throughout the country.

The Wood Badge course is designed

to represent a month in the life of a Scout unit. Participants will take part in numerous presentations, discussions, and activities that explore and advance a wide range of leadership philosophies and tools. In addition to all the opportunities for learning at a Wood Badge course, participants will find a tremendous amount of fellowship, a keen sense of accomplishment, and plenty of fun.

Wood Badge Objectives

• View Scouting globally, as a family of interrelated, value-based programs that provide age-appropriate activities for youth.

• Recognize the contemporary leadership concepts utilized in corporate America that are relevant to our valuesbased program.

• Apply the skills you learn as a member of a successful working team.

• Revitalize your commitment by sharing an overall inspirational experience that helps provide Scouting with the leadership it needs to accomplish its on-going mission.

The Tsali bike trip was amazing in many ways. Some of the most exciting times of the bike trip were on the bike trails, (the Mouse Gap trail and Thompson Loop). And one of the coolest things was at nighttime. When we first arrived at our campsite I didn't realize it but you could have seen almost every star in the sky including the Milky Way because of how dark it was. The stars might have been amazing to see but it was still cold putting

up our tents. In the morning, it was still very cold but there was excitement in the air about the bike trail.

After breakfast, we picked our bikes and prepared to hit the trail. When we came to the beginning of the two trails, we were given a lecture on how to be safe and stay on the trail. And occasionally there were some sharp turns that you either went slow on or had to hit the brakes to stop from going of the trail.

Unfortunately, one of the older scouts had his bike chain break. Though they soon got it back on, one part of the bike had been broken permanently, and he had to walk the rest of the trail. The rest of the trail was easy, even though we were slowed down.

When we got back to the campsite we had lunch. After lunch, our senior patrol leader told us to mount our bikes. Most of the people who went on the Mouse Gap Trail in the morning were tired and didn't want to go, but the Brenden wouldn't let those scouts sit around doing nothing and got them to mount their bikes any way. We were split into two groups - one for Mouse Gap, and one for Thompson Loop. We

When we got to the intersection, we went the other way for the Thompson Loop. On the trail, it was all up hill and no down hill for about 1 mile. When we got to the top, some of the scouts were tired and couldn't continue. One of the leaders rode down with them and we realized that we could now go longer without stopping. The way back down was fast but too short. In no time at all, we were all back at camp. After dinner, we reviewed what happened during the bike trail during the campfire, and then went to bed. The next morning we were up early and on our way back home.

All in all, we had another successful bike trip. The general sentiment among the scouts was to plan future bike trips earlier in the year to take advantage of warmer weather. This will also permit the troop to consider other trail options that are otherwise closed at this time of year.
