




Troop Outings


As a Scout, you are encourage to join in this project. Every logo contest entrant will receive a commemorative certificate and patch from the National Council recognizing their effort.

It is with great sadness that we inform you of the passing of Mr. John Belk. An Eagle Scout, Mr. Belk was a long time Scouter with the Mecklenburg County Council.

John earned his Eagle Scout badge in 1947 and was honored as a Distinguished Eagle Scout in 1974. While serving in the U.S. Army during the Korean War he had organized several Boy Scout troops in Korea. Following the Korean War he had served as the Advisor of Explorer Post 55, chartered to Myers Park Presbyterian Church. John was a vice president of our council from 1954 to 1959. During 1960 – 1961, he served as council president. John also served as SE-7 Region President and also served on the National Committee. Mr. Belk was recognized for his service with the Silver Beaver, Silver Antelope and Silver Buffalo and was also a Distinguished Eagle Scout. He served as mayor of Charlotte from 1969 through 1977.

His family founded Belk Department Stores and he ran the retail chain for over 50 years. Well known for his philanthropy, Mr. Belk donated the

land for our council service center in 1966 and raised funds to construct the building.

A ceremony was held on September 25 recognize Mr. John Belk and the Belk family for their unwavering support of Scouting by renaming Clear Creek to Belk Scout Camp.

Several Troop 19 Eagle Scouts and I had the opportunity to take part in honoring Mr. Belk on his 80th birthday at a celebration at Founders Hall. John Belk was a kind and generous man with a wonderful sense of humor. For those who had the honor, it was a great privilege to know Mr. Belk and he will be sorely missed. He will remain one of our council's greatest Scouters.

The stations started right at 8 o'clock on Saturday morning. We jumped into things right at 8 o'clock. From the time we left our camp site till the time we got to our first station, we sang to keep our spirits high and full of energy.

The first station we came to was disabilities awareness. They had us perform tasks that are strange to us, but they were things that people with disabilities would go through. There was a maze that you had to go through blind, a wheel chare course, and a place where you had to do a maze looking through a mirror. There were many stations throughout the day. Every station tested our physical, mental, and scout abilities in some way, shape, or form.

After a long hard day of eight different stations, some being in the water, on dry land and in a field, the day was complete. So we made our way back to camp without our flag. You might ask, "why we didn't have our flag?" Well, at the very last station we were able to sell our flag for two points (seeing how there were no more stations for us to complete.) When we arrived back at camp, we found that we had an extra shirt so we made another flag right before dinner and campfire (we didn't want to get caught without a flag at campfire).

Dinner was being served at six and our hungry little stomachs made sure we were there on time. Dinner turned out to be some kind of down time that only added to our suspense. Throughout the whole day, we tried our hardest to

win first place and now it was all up to the numbers.

They had also won two station awards compared to our none. This was amazing. All day after lunch I heard tones of things about the Chuck Norris patrol, it sounded like they were going to win for sure.

Well things are deceiving and they called Troop 19 Konvicks

up for First Place! So we went up and received our award. Real quick I would like to go back to a few things. We sold our flag for two points. If you do the math, we would have come in third if we had not sold our flag. All through the day, there were little things that made such an amazing impact when you see where we ended up.

The next morning rolled around and it was time for church. Troop 19 had all of our gear up at the bus like all ways and we were getting ready to take the picture when a car drove up. Mr. Banks and I went over to see what was going on. The night before when the scout master was adding up the points they found a typo on the Chuck Norris patrol's sheet. At one station they made a 23 instead of a 20 resulting in a three point difference. Remember when I said that there was a one point margin between each place, that included first and second. So officially they now moved two points in head of the Troop 19 Konvicks, we had actu-

ally won second place.

Everyone makes mistakes and it does cause problems and very sad feelings to be striped of first place, but it happens. So we gave back the first place paddle to the rightful winners. This was a very eventful weekend even though it resulted in us winning second place, eighth place and twelfth place I know that we all had a blast. I do not get upset when I think about how first place was taken from us. I just think of it as a challenge, and I hope no one else is upset about us getting second. It just shows all the things we should have done better. I know that next year I will do that and this better so that I can help my patrol make sure that there will not be even that slightest gap of one or two or three points. So that no matter what mistakes are found we will still be declared the winner no matter what happens.
