Update On Troop 19 Eagles


Congratulations to Troop 19 Eagle Scout **Scott Marum.** Scott was married to Ms. Bethany Early in October 2009.



we all learned skills applicable for life, Scouts, school and family.





2009 S.E.A.L.S.


