### Davidson Day project awarded first Scout Eagle of 2010

Scout project.

"It was a nice day outside and I thought it would be a good idea if I could build enough picnic tables for the entire class to eat outside," said the senior.

Wesley's dream will soon become a reality. He organized the construction of eight large picnic tables for the school, a project that earned him an Eagle, the highest award in Scouting.

Wesley is a member of Troop 19 in Huntersville and officially received his award on New Year's Day. The Mecklenburg Council of the Boy Scouts confirmed for *DavidsonNews* that Wesley was the first Boy Scout to receive an Eagle for 2010.

He may be the first for the year, but he is not the first in his family to get an Eagle. He follows in the footsteps of both his father, Kevin King, and his brother, Nicholas.

Wesley's picnic tables are each eight-feet long and he said the hardest part of the project was figuring out how to get them from his garage to Davidson Day.

"They're very, very heavy," he said, adding that it took two borrowed vehicles and a crew of friends to put the benches in place.

Now Wesley keeps an eye out on his project every time he walks into the Davidson Day entrance, noticing little flaws (he thinks one is not quite level) and appreciating the ways students are already using them.

"I hope they last a long time," he said.




### Faces of the Founders

Their names are splashed across Scout councils, camps, museums, and awards, but who were the men who created the Scouting program?

#### Robert Stephenson Smyth Baden-Powell (1857-1941)



In October 1899, several thousand Boer fighters One winter day in New laid siege to the South York, Beard came across African town Mafeking, where Robert Baden-Powell led Printing House Square. It a force of some 800 was British soldiers. Through "started held off the Boers for 217 sneaking days,

reports through the lines that ended up on the front pages of British newspapers. When Mafeking was relieved in May 1900, he became a national hero.

Three years later, Baden-Powell (by then a general) returned to England and was astonished to find British (president), Kit Carson (treasurer), and Davy Crockett boys using an army manual he'd written called Aids to Scouting as a guide to outdoor fun. For the next four he renamed the group the Boy Pioneers of America and years, he studied boys' programs-including Ernest published its first handbook. Thompson Seton's Woodcraft Indians in America-and decided to start his own program.

In 1906, Baden-Powell drafted a paper called "Boy first national commissioners. Scouts - A Suggestion," proposing a way to "help in "Uncle Dan," as he was known, remained involved in making the rising generation, of whatever class or creed, into good citizens at home or for the colonies." A year later, he organized a camp on Brownsea Island to test his ideas. The camp, which involved 12 upper-class boys and nine working-class boys, was a rousing success.

In 1908, Baden-Powell published Scouting for Boys and formally launched the Boy Scout movement. Over the next few years, he watched as Scouting spread throughout the British colonies and beyond. In 1913, he proposed a gathering of Scouts from around the world, planting the seeds for what would become the first World Scout Jamboree in 1920 in London, England. 

### Daniel Carter Beard (1850-1941)

Daniel Carter Beard grew up hearing stories of pioneer days and exploring the woods near his Covington, Ky.,

In 1905, in the pages of Recreation magazine, Beard created a loosely organized boys' program he called the Sons of Daniel Boone. Somewhere between 2,000 and 20,000 boys joined the group in the next few years, organizing themselves in "forts" and "stockades" and taking on the names of heroes such as Daniel Boone (secretary). When Beard joined Pictorial Review magazine,

With the advent of the BSA, Beard shut down his nascent organization and joined the BSA as one of the


#### Ernest Thompson Seton (1860-1946)

Born in England and raised in Canada, Ernest Thompson Seton was a naturalist, artist, and writer and lover of Native American culture. The success of his 1898 book Wild Animals I Have Known allowed him to build a small estate in Cos Cob, Conn.



He cobbled together a provisional handbook from Baden-Powell's Scouting for Boys and the Birch-Bark Roll and in the preface took credit for starting Scouting.

By 1915, Seton himself was on the outside looking in. He and Chief Scout Executive James E. West had never seen eye to eye, and on Dec. 5, Seton called a press conference to announce his resignation from the BSA. His verdict on Scouting was simple: "Seton started it; Baden-Powell boomed it; West killed it." In 1926, the BSA papered over its rift with Seton by giving him one of the first Silver Buffalo Awards.

#### William Dickson Boyce (1858-1929)

Much like Baden-Powell, Seton, and Beard, William D. Boyce, a wealthy Chicago newspaper publisher, came to boys' work by accident. In August 1909, he was in London, preparing for an African safari, when he got

Despite his interest in youth and in Scouting, Boyce had neither the time nor the inclination to run the BSA. He quickly turned its leadership over to Edgar M. Robinson, the senior boys' work secretary of the YMCA's International Committee in New York. Boyce did agree to give the BSA \$1,000 per month for operating expensesprovided that boys of all races and creeds be includedbut that was the extent of his involvement.

#### James Edward West (1876-1948)

Orphaned at age six and afflicted with tuberculosis, James E. West never had much of a childhood.





### Edgar M. Robinson (1867-1951)

Edgar M. Robinson led the BSA for just eight months, they were critical of the Arrow-Scouting's months for the movement.

#### William Hillcourt (1900-1992)

Known to generations of Scouts as "Green Bar Bill," William Hillcourt wrote three editions of The Boy Scout Handbook, three patrol leader handbooks, the first American Scoutmaster's handbook, the first Scout Fieldbook, numerous other books, and a Boys' Life column that ran from 1932 to 1965.

Born in Denmark as Vilhelm Hans Bjerregaard Jensen, Hillcourt earned Danish Scouting's highest rank, Knight -Scout, in 1918 and attended World Scout Jamborees in 1920 and 1924. At the 1924 event, he met American Scouter William Wessel, who helped him get a job with the BSA in the United States in 1926.

Wood Badge is Scouting's premier Designed by training course. Scouting founder Robert Baden-Powell so that Scouters could learn, in as practical a way possible, the skills and methods of Scouting. It is first and foremost,

learning by doing where members of the course form patrols and a part of a troop. The entire troop lives in the out-of-doors for a week, camping, cooking their own meals, and practicing Scout skills. After the practical portion is completed, Scouters develop a series of goals to benefit their personal growth in Scouting and a series of tasks or ticket to benefit Scouting.

On January 9th, 2010 Assistant Scout Master Juan Lorenzo received his Wood Badge beads in recognition of completing the National Wood Badge requirements.

Juan participated in the Wood Badge course from April through May 2009 in which ASM Craig Orr and Dan Hardesty were staff members and continue to play an active role in Wood Badge course training.

Mr. Lorenzo attained this designation by completing various projects or also what is known as tickets in the Wood Badge vernacular.

Mr. Lorenzo was actively involved in the Summer Camp Trailblazer program, the 100 Year Scouting Anniversary program coordinator, the Guilford Courthouse hike outing with the Webelos II and Troop, developed the Spanish translation program, a first for the Troop, that continues throughout the year for all scouts, and finally the coordination and participation in the Thanksgiving Day parade.





# 100 Things You Didn't Know About Scouting

This article is published by the BSA and presented on their website. We have re published the first 32 of the 100 things you didn't know about Scouting. The remainder will come in future newsletters.

1. Neil Armstrong, the first man to walk on the moon, is an Eagle Scout. When he said, "The Eagle has landed," he wasn't kidding. In 1969, Armstrong became the first Eagle Scout to be portrayed on a U.S. postage stamp - called "The Man on the Moon."

2. The Invention merit badge (1911–1918) required the candidate to obtain a patent.

3. *Boys' Life* magazine, which goes to 1.1 million Scouts each month, was started by an 18-year-old Scout, Joseph Lane, in 1911. A year later, the Boy Scouts of America bought the magazine for \$6,100 - about \$1 per subscriber.

4. James E. West was the BSA's first Chief Scout Executive. When he took the position in 1911, he agreed to serve six months. At his retirement in 1943, he was given the title of Chief Scout.

5. The BSA is the second-largest Scouting organization in the world. The largest is in Indonesia.

6. One of Scouting's most popular traditions, patch trading, has bloomed into a full-fledged hobby. Some rare patches are worth thousands of dollars.

7. For all but two years from 1925 to 1976, illustrator Norman Rockwell illustrated the annual Brown & Bigelow Boy Scout calendar - for free.

8. Former Congressmen Alan Simpson and Norman Mineta served together from the mid-1970s to the late 1990s. They met as Boy Scouts during World War II, when Simpson's troop from Cody, Wyoming, visited the internment camp where Mineta and his Japanese immigrant parents were being held. The two became - and have remained - close friends and political allies.

9. The first Eagle Scout to earn all available merit badges was Leon Wallace in 1922.

10. In May 1964, 29 of American's 30 astronauts visited Philmont for a two-week training trip to learn geological mapping and seismographic studies in preparation for the Apollo programs.

11. Three important Eagle Scouts all have names beginning with "A." The first Eagle Scout is Arthur Eldred (1912) of Long Island, New York; the 1 millionth Eagle (1982) is Alexander Holsinger of Normal, Illinois; and the 2 millionth Eagle (2009) is Anthony Thomas of Lakeville, Minnesota.

12. Scouts collected more than 65 million containers of food during the first Scouting for Food drive in 1988.

13. The Cub Scout sign (the index and middle fingers extended in a V shape) symbolizes the ears of an alert wolf. It replaced the Indian "how" sign, which looked too much like the Nazi salute.

14. The BSA sells 2.3 million merit badges - one for each person in the state of Utah - every year.

15. After eating candy when he had promised not to, a repentant Howard Hughes returned his Buckskin Badge to Daniel Carter Beard with a note that read, "With love, from Howard."

16. By the BSA's centennial in February 2010, more than 1.2 billion *Boys' Life* magazines will have been printed.

17. At age 12, Seattle Mariners Chairman and CEO Howard Lincoln posed for Norman Rockwell's painting *The Scoutmaster*.

18. On February 8, 1910, William D. Boyce incorporated the Boy Scouts of America. He personally donated \$1,000/month to keep the organization afloat - on the condition that boys of all races and creeds be admitted.

19. In 1920, the BSA sent 301 Scouts to the inaugural world Scout jamboree in England, where they joined Scouts from 33 other countries. The American Scouts represented all 48 states plus the territory of Hawaii.

20. In 1933, President Franklin Roosevelt requested the Boy Scouts' service in collecting 1.8 million items of clothing, household furnishings, foodstuffs, and supplies for victims of the Great Depression.

21. After the 1941 attack on Pearl Harbor, Hawaiian Scouts set up first-aid stations and emergency kitchens, helped evacuate civilians, served as messengers, and manned 58 air-raid sirens around Honolulu.

22. During a three-month drive in the spring of 1942, Scouts collected 318,000 tons of paper for the war effort.

23. In a nationwide nonpartisan get-out-the-vote campaign in 1956, Scouts distributed more than a million posters and 36 million Liberty Bell doorknob hangers.

24. In 1954, the BSA conducted a National Conservation Good Turn, distributing 3.6 million conservation posters. In parks, rural areas, and wilderness areas, Scouts planted 6.2 million trees, and built and placed 55,000 bird nesting boxes.

25. Scouts collected more than 1 million tons of litter on Scouting Keep America Beautiful Day in 1971.

26. The Soviet Union turned to the BSA in 1993 for help in producing the first Russian Scout handbook; 20,000 copies were distributed.

27. The 20 millionth Scout was registered with the BSA in 1952; by 2000, that number reached 100 million.

28. The gravestone of worldwide Scouting founder Robert Baden-Powell is marked with a trail symbol of a circle with a dot in the center, which means "I have gone home."

29. While Robert Baden-Powell's English Scouts had nine points in their Scout Law, the Boy Scouts of America added three more: A Scout is brave, clean, and reverent.

30. In 1929, an African American Boy Scout from Fort Worth, Texas, found and returned a woman's pocketbook that contained more than \$300 in cash. The boy declined her liberal reward, saying, "No, madam. I am a Boy Scout and cannot take a tip for doing my duty."

31. Scouts have served at every presidential inauguration since Woodrow Wilson's in 1913. Boy Scouts who helped out at the Wilson inauguration were Honor Medal recipients.

32. Portions of the 1963 movie "PT 109," the story of the sinking of John F. Kennedy's PT boat during World War II, were filmed on Big Munson Island at the Florida National High Adventure Sea Base.
