




Myrtle Beach Fishing Trip

When everybody went to bed, we thought the fire was put out for good, but it flared back up and the Scoutmasters had to come and put it out three times! I thought that was



quite funny.

I put the trash in very slowly so the raccoon wouldn't jump up and attack me. It was really cool because I had never seen one in a dumpster before. 


