A Scout is Trustworthy

The person who can be trusted in little things can be trusted also in great; and the person who is dishonest in the little things is dishonest in great things. (Luke 16: 10)

A Scout is Loyal.

My friends stand firm and immovable and work without limit since you know that in the Lord your labor cannot be lost. (1 Corinthians 15:58)

A Scout is Helpful.

When I was hungry, you gave me food; when I was thirsty, you gave me drink; when I was a stranger, you took me in your home; when clothed me; when I was ill, you came to my help; when in prison, you visited me. (Matthew 25: 35 - 36)

A Scout is Friendly.

A person who has friends must show himself friendly. (Proverbs 18:24)

A Scout is Courteous.

Be all of one mind, having compassion one of (Hebrews 12:28) another, love as friends, be kind, be courteous. (1 Peter 3:8)

A Scout is Kind

Be kind to one another, tender hearted, forgiving one another as God in Christ forgave you. (Ephesians 4:32)

Children, obey your parents, for it is right that you should. If you love Me, you will obey my command. (Ephesians 6:1 - John 14:15)

A Scout is Cheerful

A glad heart makes cheerful countenance. (Proverbs 15: 13)

A Scout is Thrifty

Precious treasure remains in a wise man's dwelling, but a foolish man devours it. (Proverbs 21:20)

A Scout is Brave

Be strong and of good courage and do it. Fear not be not dismayed; for the Lord God even my God is with you. (1 Chronicles 28:20)

Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me. (Psalms 51:10)

A Scout is Reverent

Therefore, let us be grateful for receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, and thus let us offer to God acceptable worship, with reverence and awe, for our God is a consuming fire.

The Pledge of Allegiance

In the late 1950's a famous comedian and actor named Red Skelton recorded this story. He was well known for his patriotism and he felt a great concern that American children were too often reciting the words of the Pledge of Allegiance and losing sight of the meaning behind the words. He decided to record these definitions so that all who heard his words would begin to see the Pledge in a new way and understand why the words - each of the words - for the Pledge were chosen.

The timing of his recording was important. some sort of retaliation. American values were changing. The United States had just fairly with others. added Alaska and Hawaii to our union, the battle for Civil Rights had begun and Congress had just FOR ALL: For all, which means, boys and girls, it's added the phase "under God" to the pledge to arrive at its current form. His definitions are as true today as they were more than 50 years ago.

I: Me, an individual, a committee of one.

ALLEGIANCE: My love and my devotion.

TO THE FLAG: Our standard, Old Glory, a symbol of freedom. Wherever she waves, there's respect because your loyalty has given her a dignity that shouts freedom is everybody's job.

UNITED: That means that we have all come together.

STATES: Individual communities that have united into 48 great states. Forty-eight individual communities with pride and dignity and purpose;

all divided with imaginary boundaries yet united to a common purpose, and that's love for country.

AND TO THE REPUBLIC: A state in which sovereign power is invested in representatives chosen by the people to govern. And government is the people, and it's from the people to the leaders, not from the leaders to the people.

FOR WHICH IT STANDS, ONE NATION: One nation, meaning "so blessed by God."

INDIVISIBLE: Incapable of being divided.

WITH LIBERTY: Which is freedom, the right of power to live one's own life without threats, fear, or

as much your country as it is mine.

And now, boys and girls, let me hear you recite the Pledge of Allegiance:

"I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, and to the PLEDGE: Dedicate all of my worldly goods to Republic for which it stands: one nation, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

> Since I was a small boy, two states have been added to our country, and two words have been added to the Pledge of Allegiance: "under God." Wouldn't it be a pity if someone said that is a prayer, and that would be eliminated from schools too?

> In the 1960's Red Skelton had a television variety show on CBS. At the end of each episode of his television show, Mr. Skelton would sign off with "Good night and God bless" Red Skelton, a man of deep faith in God and great love of his country, died in 1997.







A Flock of Young Eagles

In the March 25 edition of the Lake Norman Citizen, Managing Editor Lori Helms wrote the following article about the Young brothers; three of Troop 19 Eagle and two picnic tables at the park, adjacent to its play-Scouts and all sons of former ASM Ronnie Young and ground designed for children with special needs. his wife Cathy. Alright, that's not exactly what you call it when eagles decide to congregate. The appropriate term for a gathering of such critters is a "convocation." But contrary to that flocking instinct, eagles are naturally solitary creatures, so the odds of witnessing a convocation of eagles are pretty low.

Unless you live somewhere near the Cedarfield home of the Young family, that is. It's there that you'll likely find three eagles, of sorts, hovering around their Huntersville home.

Brothers Jacob and Alex Young were recently joined by their younger brother, Connor, to bring the Eagle Scout count under one roof to three — an oddity, albeit a welcome one, for their proud parents as well as their scoutmaster, Larry Banks.

Banks has seen a lot in his nearly 25 years in scouting with Troop 19, which meets at Huntersville Presbyterian Church, but nothing quite as unique as a trio of Eagle achievers from one family.

"I just can't say enough about the boys," says Banks. "They're just three outstanding young men."

On March 13, Connor Young made the triumvirate of talent official with his Eagle Scout recognition ceremony, honoring his body of Scout work as well as the work he performed on a project at Richard Barry Park on Beatties Ford Road in Huntersville. With the help of nearly

20 other Scouts, Scout leaders and friends, the youngest

Young's project involved the construction and installation of a large, two-tiered landscaped timber picnic area

The project included a handicapped-accessible table and the planting of shrubs as well as three large maple trees, one of which was planted in memory of Young's grandfather, Ted Coleman.

Eagle mom Cathy Jo Young says her son's project was months in the making, and was a bookend of sorts on her time spent as a member of Huntersville's Parks and Recreation Commission over the course of about a dozen years. Her son and second Eagle Scout Alex built and installed six benches, a picnic table and landscaping at Huntersville Athletic Park (HAP) in 2006. She says HAP was one of the first parks whose planning in which she was involved, and the Richard Barry Park that is now home to son Connor's project was the last.

"You just really see the benefits that these projects can have on the community," she says of her sons' works.

Connor's Eagle Scout recognition caps a long line of public service for the Young children, beginning with Jacob Young's Eagle Scout award in November 2003. Jacob installed a large brick patio with two concrete tables and landscaping behind the church's family life cen-



"They're just a great scouting family," says Banks, adding that father Ronnie Young has been a long time leader with the troop. "They've been involved with these path and study computer information systems beginning boys since they were Tiger Cubs."

And those years of investment in promoting service and leadership appear to be paying off. Jacob, now 23 and engaged, will graduate from Appalachian State University this spring with a double major in computer information and accounting, and will return to Charlotte this summer to work for Duke Energy.

Alex, Hopewell High's valedictorian in 2008 and now attending N.C. State, is a junior in the Air Force ROTC program studying aerospace engineering, and Banks says Alex hopes to one day fly for the Navy.

As for Connor, mom says he's been accepted at Appalachian State, and will likely follow big brother Jacob's this fall.

And the oldest, Jacob, may just end up circling back on his scouting years. Scoutmaster Banks says it's possible that he could end up returning to Troop 19 some time in June or July, this time as an assistant scoutmaster.

"These are three great young men," says Banks. "They definitely got out of scouting everything that scouting offers." — Lori Helms




