

Any Scout or Scouter who participates in a project that has had a significant impact on the community in any one of the three dimensions above can qualify as a Messenger of Peace. A Scout or Scouter who participates in a qualifying project is eligible to wear a Messengers of

### **100th Eagle Scout**

On the 12th day of the 12th month of 2012, Troop 19 Life Scout **Patrick Shawn Cowley** became the 100th Scout to earn his Eagle Award while a member of the Troop. Troop 19 has been awarding Eagle medals to young men since our first, **William Brevard Blythe II** in July 1943.

Notably, Patrick earned his award in the Centennial Year of the Eagle Scout Award, 100 years since the first Eagle Scout, Arthur R Eldred of Troop 1 in Oceanside, NY was recognized on Labor Day 1912. This achievement earns Patrick recognition as our 100th Eagle in the celebration of the 100th Anniversary of the Eagle Scouts.

Since our first Eagle, we have had 7 Scoutmasters, the United States has had 13 Presidents, fought five major wars, gone through the Beatniks, the Peace and Anti War movements, Disco and the end of the Cold War in Europe. Through it all, Troop 19 continued to produce young men who put determination, faith and honor together and climbed the trail to Eagle.

For his project, Patrick built a trail at the Carolina Raptor Center that was more than 200 feet long in support of new observation cage at the Raptor Center that is used by scientists to observe owls hunting at night.


