


Scoutmaster Banks and his 99th Eagle Scout - John Hayden Gary

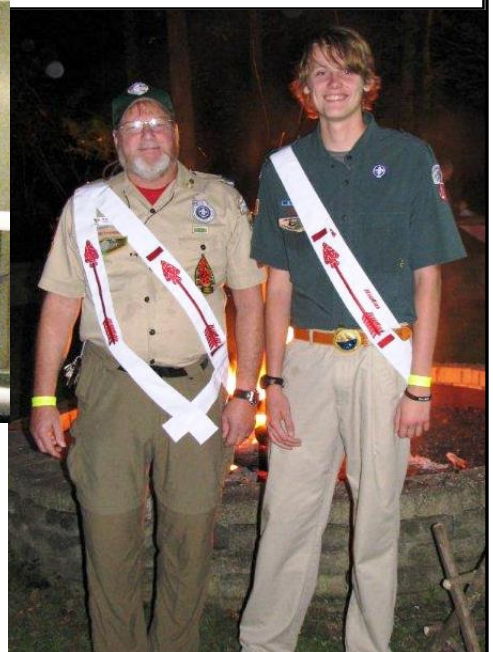

Eagle Update

Second Lieutenant Alex Young, Troop 19 Alumni who achieved Eagle Scout in 2006, recently graduated from Air Force Euro NATO Joint Jet Pilot Training (ENJJPT) this past September where he received his military combat aviator wings.

ENJJPT is a multi-national pilot training program involving 13 NATO countries and their student pilots as well as instructors. It is the only pilot training program of its kind and considered the premier combat pilot training program in the world. ENJJPT is a 55 week program that consists of training in the T-6 Texan II and the T-38 Talon aircraft on the way to a student pilot earning his follow on aircraft assignment. Lt Young was in Class 14-08 which consisted of 17 American and 6 Norwegian student pilots.

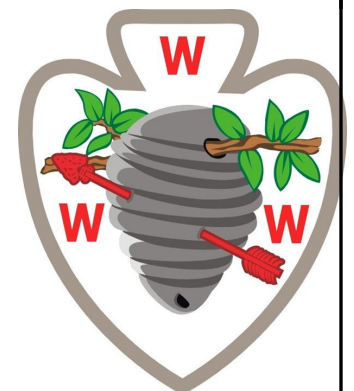
After a year of training, Lt Young earned his follow on aircraft assignment, the F-15E Strike Eagle, which will bring him back to Goldsboro, NC to train at Seymour Johnson AFB next spring. Lt Young credits his experience achieving the rank of Eagle as a Boy Scout in Troop 19 helping prepare him to serve as an officer in the United States military and get him to where he is today.

I went to Philmont Scout Ranch this summer and it was a great experience! I was doing a program, which I'd highly recommend if you'd like to go, called the OA Trail Crew. Basically, we worked building trail for a week, and then we hiked for a week. The foreman put together the itinerary for where the crew goes based on their interests, which means that there's plenty of interesting things to do.

Some of the things I particularly enjoyed are the spar-pole climbing and the archery course.

Philmont has several other interesting programs as well that you might like to check out, such as the ROCS - Roving Outdoor Conservation School - or Rayado, a 21 day trek that's more about the hiking than the activities. I would say that, at least from my experience, Philmont will definitely be challenging. You'll probably be getting up fairly early, hiking 6-10 miles on average (unless you're Rayado, which is more), and have the delicious experience of eating trail food; to be fair, it's not bad at all when you're hungry.

If you do decide to go to Philmont, here are some tips. Pack light - you don't want to



be carrying any more than you have to, as the backpack will start to feel really heavy over the course of the trip. You don't need to pack more clothes than a couple outfits. Make sure someone has a map and can read it. It'll be extremely useful when you get lost to approximate where you are by looking at contour lines and other landmarks. Bring at least three 1 liter water bottles. You'll drink a lot, and any water you carry will be helpful when you stop at a dry camp without a stream or pump.

It'll be a great adventure, and you'll make memories that will last a lifetime.

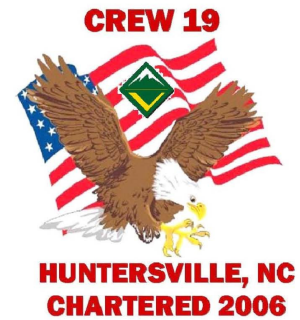

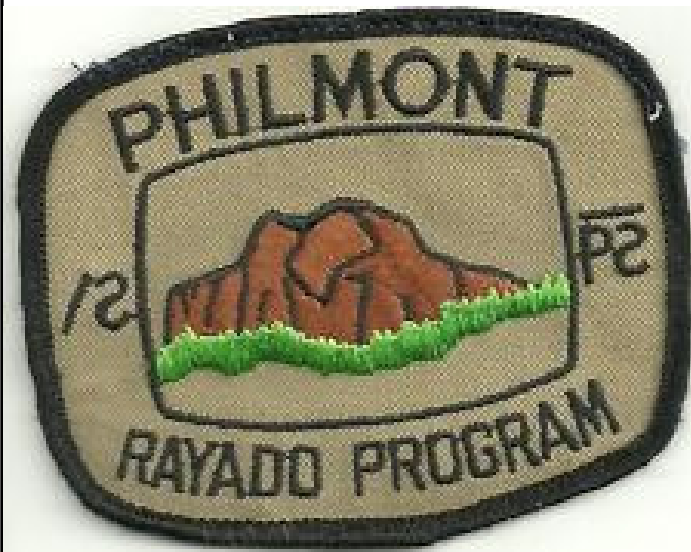
